AGING SERVICES

AGING DISABILITY RESOURCE CONNECTIONS (ADRC)

Links clients to a range of services, assistance and information. Focus is seniors, vets and people with disabilities. A single source for information and assistance. No income requirements. Programs include the following:

- Senior Health Insurance Benefit Assistance (SHIBA): Volunteers provide counseling to Medicare beneficiaries, regarding choices about health and prescription drugs plans. They compare Medigap (supplemental) health insurance policies, select a prescription drug plan, evaluate long term care and ensure seniors are receiving all possible benefits.
- Adult Protective Services. Can call to report someone over 65 who is being threatened, mistreated or abused or in danger of mistreatment or physical abuse
- Gatekeeper Program. Streamlines access of isolated or vulnerable people who need help by connecting critical social service agencies

ALZHEIMER'S ASSOCIATION

Provides support services for adults with Alzheimer's disease or other forms of dementia. Resources, tools and programming are provided for the adults their families, and health care professionals. Provides all-inclusive medical and social services for older adults; 97% of recipients are on Medicaid. Manages medical care in the home with in-home coordinators (includes health and social programs). Services are transportation to doctor, socialization, interaction and lunch services. Each client has own social worker managing the client's care.

HOUSING ASSISTANCE

AFRICAN AMERICAN ALLIANCE FOR HOMEOWNERSHIP

Provides help with buying a house including down payment assistance and mortgage assistance programs. Also provides foreclosure prevention counseling.

Brings together resources and volunteers to meet the home repair and remodeling needs of under-resourced people. They have 500 volunteers as well as licensed and bonded contractors.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Provides qualifying families the opportunity to purchase Habitat homes by contributing 500 hours of "Sweat Equity" and a down payment. The families receive a zero-percent interest rate mortgage and monthly payments structured to their income. Repairs homes for qualifying residents who own their own home. Habitat works in partnership with low-income families, volunteers, and donors.

REACH COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Works to keep low income seniors in their homes by providing free home repairs after doing a home assessment. These could include installing smoke and fire alarms, addressing minor plumbing and electrical problems and roof repairs and installing bathroom safety aids. Must meet income requirements. For two people, the maximum total income is \$29,360.

UNLIMITED CHOICE

Adapt a Home Project removes barriers and makes affordable housing accessible for low and moderate income people with disabilities. Provide ramps, widened ramps, raised toilets, handrails and other modifications. The Nuts and Bolts Project is for individuals or families who are able and wish to pay privately to make their home more accessible for the health and safety of people with a physical disability. Private pay program: \$200 assessment fee. If they see project to completion, \$200 goes toward cost of project.
